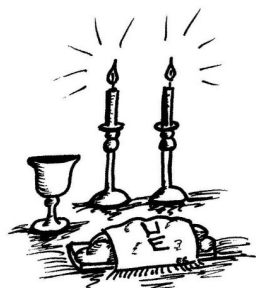

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

MARCHESHVAN

Misconception: The complete and correct name for the month following Tishrei is Cheshvan, and it is a quaint tradition to call it Mar Cheshvan because it is bitter (Hebrew: *mar*) due to its lack of holidays.

Fact: The correct name for this fall month is the one word Marcheshvan/M'rachsh'van (*Aruch Hashulchan, Even Ha'ezer* 126:17).

This misconception has halachic implications. Since the mistaken practice of simply calling the month Cheshvan is so widespread, either Cheshvan or the two word Mar Cheshvan is now acceptable, post-facto, if erroneously used in a legal document such as a *get*.

Surprisingly, there are even customs that developed around the error. The assumption is that it is called Mar Cheshvan (the bitter Cheshvan) either due to its lack of holidays or because it is when Sarah the Matriarch died. Because of those negative associations, there are those who refrain from getting married in Marcheshvan.

The Bnei Yissaschar (2:56-57) relates a beautiful *midrash* about the future of Marcheshvan indicating that the dedication of the Third Temple will occur in Marcheshvan, removing any doubt about it being a bitter month.

Marcheshvan in Jewish history and tradition

- **11 Marcheshvan** (circa 2105 BCE) - Methuselah dies at age 969
- **11 Marcheshvan** (circa 1553 BCE) - Death of Rachel while giving birth to Benjamin
- **12 Cheshvan** (1995) - Assassination of Yitzhak Rabin; now a national memorial day
- **15 Marcheshvan** (165 BCE) - Death of Matityahu (Mattathias), who began the Maccabean revolt in the city of Modiin
- **16 Marcheshvan** (1938) - Kristallnacht/Pogromnacht
- **17 Marcheshvan** (circa 2105 BCE) - Great Flood began, Noah and his family enter the ark
- **17 Marcheshvan** (circa 960 BCE) - First Temple completed by King Solomon (it was not inaugurated until the following Tishrei however)
- **20 Marcheshvan** (1938) 1,400 synagogues and numerous copies of the Tanakh are purposefully and systematically set on fire and allowed to burn in Nazi-occupied Germany
- **23 Marcheshvan** (137 BCE) - Hasmonean holiday commemorating the removal from the Holy Temple of altar stones which were defiled by the Greeks
- **27 Marcheshvan** (circa 2104 BCE) - Great Flood ends (Genesis 8:14)

MarCheshvan begins the extended time span between the last festival, Sukkot, and the next, Passover. In the meantime, the spiritual seeds planted during the Jewish month of Tishrei begin to take root – to be watered and to grow, finally appearing and bearing fruit in Nissan of next year.

The message of MarCheshvan is that despite the darkness, and even because of the darkness, there is future growth that awaits us. We have the opportunity to nurture that right at this moment. It is now that we gather the seeds from the holidays of the month of Tishrei, plant them, and carefully water them through the winter months. With God's help, we will soon marvel at the beautiful spring bounty that we merit to cultivate.

KISLEV

Kislev is the ninth month on the Jewish calendar, counting from Nissan. It is best known for the holiday of Chanukah, which begins on the 25th of Kislev. The message of Chanukah is the eternal power of light over darkness—good over evil. Aside from commemorating the miraculous victory of the small and militarily weak Jewish army over the mighty Syrian-Greek empire, on Chanukah we celebrate the miracle of the oil. When the Jews sought to light the Temple menorah after the war, they found only one small jug of oil that had not been defiled by the pagan invaders. Miraculously, the one-day supply burned for eight days until new pure oil could be obtained. In commemoration, the sages instituted the eight-day festival of Chanukah, on which we kindle the menorah nightly to recall and publicize the miracle. Chanukah is particularly significant to women, as it was Yehudit, with her wise and daring plan, who shifted the tide of war and began the Jewish victory.

- **15 Kislev** (167 BCE) - The Greeks set up the "Abomination of Desolation" in the Temple.
- **20 Kislev** (circa 457 BCE) - Ezra addresses a three-day assemblage of Jews in Jerusalem, telling them to adhere to the Torah and to dissolve their interfaith marriages.
- **25 Kislev** (167 BCE) The Greeks make pagan sacrifices in the Temple
- **25 Kislev** (164 BCE) - The Hanukkah miracle
- **27 Kislev** (circa 2105 BCE) - Flood rains cease (According to Genesis 6-8).

Our own indomitable Mollie Alkana will discuss the fascinating vivid and original novel about King David written in the voice of the one man courageous enough to challenge King David by the Pulitzer prize winning author Geraldine Brooks. In The Secret Chord Ms. Brooks reinterprets and reveals the well-known and fascinating episodes of David’s mercurial life and foregrounds other more remarkable and emotionally intense episodes that have been neglected. David’s life arcs from obscurity to fame, from shepherd to soldier, from hero to traitor, from brilliant poet, glorious musician and glamorous young tyrant into an ailing and remorseful old age. Inspired by brief tantalizing biblical references to the lost book of Nathan, Brooks tells the story through the eyes of the courtier who both counseled and castigated David. Please come and don’t miss this fascinating story. It is an eye opener! Bring a dairy sandwich and/or yogurt and we shall serve coffee and cake.

Elaine attends services at RPJC every Shabbat and all Yom Tovim and participates in every Center function. She holds the important position of Membership Vice President in Sisterhood, does an excellent job as Recording Secretary for the Breakfast Club (aka Minyan Club), is a Hadassah Life Member & a Benefactor for St. Jude’s Children’s Hospital. GENESIS TOLDOT - 25:19 - 28.9

This Parashat theme is conflict. Isaac and Rebekah became parents to twins. When Rebekah was pregnant, the twins struggled in her womb. The Lord told her, "two nations were in her womb - one mightier than the other." When the twins were born, the first came out red and hairy. They named him Esau. The second came out holding onto the heel of Esau, they named him Jacob. When they grew up, Esau became a skillful hunter - Jacob a mild man staying in the camp. Isaac favored Esau. Rebekah favored Jacob.

Once when Jacob was cooking a stew, Esau came in famished. He said, "give me that red stuff." Jacob said, "first sell me your birthright." Esau said, "I am at the point of death and what use is my birthright to me?" Jacob said, "swear to me first." Esau swore. Thus ended the first conflict.

The second conflict happened when Isaac became old and blind. At the time to bless Esau before Isaac died, Rebekah disguised Jacob as his older brother - he received the blessing meant for Esau. Fearful for Esau's revenge, Jacob fled to Rebekah's brother, Laban's home in Haran. "However the blessing does not activate until Jacob develops into a man who deserves the blessing."

HAFTARAT MALACHI 1.1. - 2.7

The word of the Lord to Israel was through Malachi. "I have shown you love, but you ask, "how have you shown love?" I have accepted Jacob and rejected Esau. I have made his hills a desolation, his territory home for beasts. If Edom thinks, though crushed, we can build again. If I am a father, where is the honor due me? If I am a master, where is the reverence due me?"

HASHEM'S PROGRAM FOR HUMAN BEHAVIOR

We greatly enjoyed a very special lecture on Sunday, September 10th during the Breakfast Club Learn-In. With great pleasure and honor, Rabbi Romiel Daniel introduced the lecturer.

Rabba Dr. Carmella Abraham Kubersky is an Orthodox Rabba, ordained through Yeshivat Maharat. She is also a doctor, working as a Medical Director of a pharmaceutical company, and is married to Dr. Steven Kubersky, who specializes in internal medicine.

The topic was "Thirteen Attributes of Hashem." Rabba Dr. Carmella Abraham Kubersky lectured in a relaxed fashion, putting us at ease to question or comment on the subject. We were given six pages of Talmud readings from the Torah. This ended with our naming Hashem's attributes as we think about ourselves during the High Holy Days and beyond. BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP



The Book Discussion Group meets at our Center once each month on Wednesday from 3:00 to 4:30 P.M. At our November 15th meeting we will discuss The Secret Chord by Geraldine Brooks.

Geraldine Brooks is a master storyteller. Her great gift is the ability to bring the past to life. She is the author of many books, among them bestsellers People of the Book and March. She is a Pulitzer Prize winner.

The Secret Chord is the story of King David who ruled over the kingdom of Israel and Judah around 1,000 BCE. Geraldine Brooks has chosen the prophet Natan to tell the story.

The young David, a shepherd, gained fame as a musician and by killing Goliath. He was a favorite of King Saul who later turned on David because he feared he was seeking to rule in his place. It was after Saul's passing that David became king.

David emerges as a courageous, clever and creative leader. He is mentioned as an ideal king and an ancestor of a future Messiah, as well as the author of our beloved psalms. He was called "the sweet singer of Israel." He is also a proud and flawed warrior hero. He committed murderous acts, failed as a husband (he had eight wives), and he was a deficient father.

Songwriter Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah" provides Geraldine Brooks the title for the book: "Now I've heard there was a secret chord/That David played and it pleased the Lord."

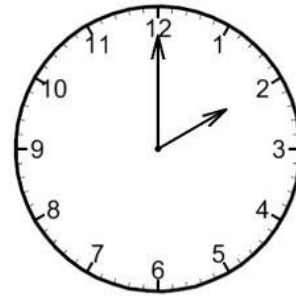
