FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

NISAN

Nisan (or Nissan) on the <u>Hebrew calendar</u> is the first month of the ecclesiastical year and the seventh month (eighth, in leap year) of the civil year. The name of the month is of <u>Assyrian-Babylonian</u> origin; in the <u>Torah</u> it is called the month of the <u>Aviv</u>. It is a spring month of 30 days. (Nisan usually falls in March–April) on the <u>Gregorian calendar</u>. In the <u>Book of Esther</u> in the <u>Tanakh</u> it is referred to as Nisan. Karaite Jews interpret it as referring to the month in which <u>barley</u> was ripe.

- 14 Nisan (1943 CE) <u>Warsaw Ghetto uprising</u> begins. The uprising would last until Iyar 3, and is now commemorated in Israel on 27 Nisan.

- 15 Nisan 1456 BCE) The Exodus from Egypt
- 15 Nisan <u>474 BCE</u> Esther appears before <u>Achashverosh</u> unsummoned and invites him and <u>Haman</u> to a feast to be held the same day. During the feast she requests that the king and Haman attend a second feast the next day.
- 16 Nisan (1273 BCE) The Children of Israel stop eating Manna, six days after entering the Holy Land.
- 16 Nisan (474 BCE) <u>Esther</u>'s second feast during which she accuses <u>Haman</u> regarding his plot to annihilate her nation. <u>Achashverosh</u> orders his servants to hang Haman.

The Month of Nisan

The Torah tells us, "And you must do this service in this month..."

The month of Nissan is a special month for the Jews, because of Passover and the several Commandments that Hashem gave us during that month. We received the Commandment of Bris Milah (Circumcision), which is a pivotal Covenant, our mutual agreement with Hashem. Those few Commandments that are called "Bris," define us as Hashem's Chosen.

Some of those are: keeping Shabbos, Milah, worshiping only Hashem and not one or more false gods, marrying only another Jew (whether born Jewish or properly converted to Judaism), and possibly some others.

We did not receive those last two in Egypt. However, during all the time we lived in Egypt no Jew ever married a non-Jew without a complete conversion. And while many of the Jews *did* worship idols for a while in Egypt, only those who made an effort to stop doing so were allowed to leave Egypt. The rest died secretly, during the Plague of Darkness.

We also received the Commandment of Shabbos during the month of Nissan, after we left Egypt, and also the Commandment of purification through the Ashes of a Red Calf.

The Month of Nissan is sort of a minor Holiday. and there are several Laws and Customs that we keep during that month. There are some minor deletions in the Prayers, and one or two extra things we say.

If there is, Heaven forbid, a funeral during the month of Nissan, we may not say a eulogy, except for a great Torah Scholar.

We do not establish a fast day or a day of mourning for the month of Nissan.

There are some exceptions to this. For example, all first born Jewish males must fast on the day before Passover.

Also, a bride and groom fast on the day of their wedding, as usual.

There used to be a custom to fast on the day of a yartzeit (anniversary of a death) of one's parent, and some people still do this, but this is not done during Nissan.

During the month of Nissan we should also visit blossoming fruit trees, and recite the special Blessing for such a sight.

And, perhaps most importantly, we are required to provide the poor with their Passover needs.

Each Jewish community is obligated to organize a charity drive for this purpose. It is called "Ma'os Chittim," which literally means "wheat money." In the Jerusalem Talmud it is called "kimche d'Pischa," Passover flour. In other words, money for matzah. But the money is not limited to such purposes; it should help the poor buy whatever they need for Passover.

Some 100 years ago or more, someone once came to a Rabbi Yisrael Salanter, and asked him a Halachic question. If he can't afford to buy wine for Passover, may he use milk for the Four Cups? (During the Seder the first two nights of Passover we must drink four cups of wine scattered throughout the proceedings. One at the beginning, one after explaining the Story of the Exodus, one after the Holiday Meal, and one after reciting the Hallel -- Psalms of praises.)

Rabbi Salanter gave the man twenty-five rubles (Russian money of the time).

After the man had left, the Rabbi's wife asked the Rabbi, "Since when does wine cost twenty-five rubles? Five rubles wouldn't have been enough?"

The Rabbi answered, "If he wanted to drink milk, that means he didn't have enough money for chicken or meat for the Holiday Meal either!"

Eating chicken or meat at the Holiday Meals are also a required part of the Holiday (unless it makes one sick). And we are required to do what we can to help the poor with ALL their needs.

Therefore, the Halachah says that the community must organize a Ma'os Chittim drive, and each person who lives in that town must contribute to it. That money may come out of one's regular tithing (charity consisting of a tenth of one's income).

One cannot be said to have truly and properly prepared for Passover unless one has also helped prepare for someone *ELSE'S* Passover as well, one way or another.

Let us celebrate the month of Nisan by giving of ourselves to the family, community and the nation so that we all participate in Tikkun Olam, the repair of the world. May the Almighty guard and protect Israel and our nation the USA which is in a state of turmoil and unrest. May G-d guide our leaders and bring our nation to a state of peace and harmony.

P'RI YADEHAH

"This is the bread of affliction which our ancestors ate in the land of Mitra'yim. All who are hungry, let them enter and eat. All who are in need, let them come to celebrate Pesach. Now we are here; next year we shall be in Israel. Now we are enslaved, next year we shall be free."

Haggadah Shel Pesach

This statement which opens the Passover Seder service is the "Leitmotif" of the Seder. It is written in Aramaic, the language of the Jews in Talmudic times and therefore assured that the invitation to come and eat would be understood by the poor, the needy and the stranger alike. The Passover Seder is designed to bring to life what Abraham Joshua Heschel called the "commandment of faith." Again and again we are called on to remember that we were slaves in Egypt. "Sek'her Litsi'at Mitzra'yim" - and we were brought out to freedom. We are requested to empty our homes of chomets which ferments. As we do this, let us also consider with what fermentation we, as individuals, are enslaved. PARASHAT & HAFTARAT CLUB SATURDAY, APRIL 29TH at 12:30 P.M.

PARASHAT TAZRIA - 12.1 - 13.59 PARASHAT METZORA - 14.1 - 15.33

These two Parashats narrate pure and impure physical human conditions and information of ritual treatment. Tazria speaks of women who had given birth to be regarded as ritually impure. If the newborn is male, she is impure for seven days. On the eighth day the flesh of the baby's foreskin shall be circumcised. The woman shall remain in a state of blood purification for thirty three days. If the newborn is female, the woman will be unclean for two weeks and in blood purification for sixty-six days.

When a person develops a swelling of the skin, a rash or a discoloration, a scaly affliction, it is reported to Aaron the priest or one of his sons. The priest examines the affected skin - if it turns white and is deeper than the skin of the flesh, it is a leprous affliction. After seven inspections, the priests declare him unclean. He shall live apart outside the camp, any article of his burned.

Metzora continues with the affected skin treatment of Leprosy. G-d then, through Moses, prescribed rituals of sacrifice to purify the body from discharges - menstrual flow and nocturnal emissions. If the plague in on the walk of the house, it should be scraped and torn down. The Israelites should be guarded against uncleanness.

HAFTARAT TAZRIA - 2 KINGS 4.42 - 5.19

Naaman was the Commander of the Army of the King of Aram. He was important to Aram and through him the Lord granted victory to Aram. Naaman, a great warrior, was a leper. Once when the Arameans were out marching, they took a young Israeli girl and she became the attendant to Naaman's wife. She said to her, "I wish Naaman could come before the prophet Elisha in Samaria, he could cure Naaman of his leprosy."

HAFTARAT METZORA - 2 KINGS 7.3 - 20

There were four men, lepers, outside the gate. They said to each other, "Why should we sit here waiting for death? If we decide to go into the town, with the famine, we shall die there." They set out for the Aramean camp. There was no one there. The Lord had caused the Aramean camp to hear sounds of chariots, horses, the sound of a huge army. They said to each other, "the King of Israel must have hired the Kings of Hittites to attack us." They fled for their lives.

The selection for our April 19th meeting is <u>The Portrait of a Lady</u> by Henry James, published in 1881. Henry James was born in 1843 in New York City and died in 1916 in Sussex, England. He became a British citizen in 1915. Mr. James lived in Europe permanently beginning in 1875 and published about 100 pieces in the next forty years. A persistent theme in his writing was the innocence in the new world and the corruption and wisdom in the old world.

Many of the primary characters in his writings were women and <u>The Portrait of a Lady</u> is no exception. Isabel Archer is the primary character in this novel and she traveled from Albany, New York to Europe to become a proper and well-rounded young woman.

Isabel Archer is described as a provincial and pretentious young woman with meager knowledge, inflated ideals, strong self-confidence, and uncompromising temperament. Through her lack of self-knowledge and her unpreparedness of European customs and conventions, Isabel suffers disillusionment and unhappiness.
