FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

TAMMUZ

The month of Tammuz is the fourth month of the Jewish calendar. In its earliest occurrence, Tammuz begins on June 10th and ends on July 8th; its latest occurrence is from July 9th to August 6th. The zodiacal sign of Tammuz is Cancer, the crab.

In the Bible, the word 'Tammuz' is mentioned in Ezekiel 8:14. The term denotes a Babylonian God and the sin of idolatry, which caused the destruction of the first Temple. The month of Tammuz is referred to as 'the fourth month' in Jeremiah 39:2.

There are always two days of Rosh Chodesh Tammuz, the celebration of the new moon. The first day of Rosh Chodesh Tammuz falls on the 30th of Sivan. The first day of Tammuz never falls on a Monday, Wednesday or Saturday. Tammuz always has 29 days.

It is said that on the third day of Tammuz, God, at the behest of Joshua, caused the sun and the moon to stop. This brought about 36 uninterrupted hours of sunlight, in order to give the conquering army of Israel time to exact vengeance from their enemy, the Emorites (Joshua 10: 12-13). The battle in which the sun stood still took place in Givon, in the Ayalon valley in central Israel.

The 17th of Tammuz signifies the commencement of the three weeks of mourning over the destruction of the first and second holy Temples. This period is traditionally called 'between the straits', ending during the following month, on the 9th of Av. During these weeks marriages are not performed, and it is customary to refrain from attending public performances of music and dancing. Ashkenazi Jews traditionally do not cut their hair or shave during this time. According to the Talmud, in messianic times the 17th of Tammuz will be transformed into a day of joy.

The permutation of the four-letter name of God (the Tetragrammaton) through which divine energy flows to the world is HVHY (hey vav hey yud) in Tammuz, emerging from the final letters of the passage in Esther (5:13) zeH enenV shaveH leY, spoken by Haman. The order is the direct reverse of the Name's regular form, YHVH. This is a sign of the stricture and judgement hanging over this tragic month until the Messianic era.

Sight is the bodily function that must be rectified during Tammuz. The majority of the time that Moses' spies spent in the holy land was during the month of Tammuz. They saw the land with eyes that lacked faith, eventually bringing back an evil report that cost the people 40 years of wandering in the desert. The tribe associated with Tammuz is Reuven, whose name means 'see a son', and is derived from the sense of sight.

According to the great medieval commentator, Rashi, the last words of the Torah, "and all the great awe that Moses did before the eyes of all of Israel", refer to the breaking of the tablets, which took place on the 17th of Tammuz. The fixing of our eyes is to realize that the broken fragments we see belong to a greater whole, which has shattered, but which can be repaired.

Tammuz is the saddest month in the Jewish calendar. In order to fix Tammuz, Jews need to repair their eyes, in order to gain messianic sight of the rectified future.

Holidays in Tammuz

17 Tammuz - Seventeenth of Tammuz – (Fast Day)

17 Tammuz is a fast day from 1 hour before sunrise to sundown in remembrance of Jerusalem's walls being breached. 17 Tammuz is the beginning of The Three Weeks, in which Jews follow similar customs as the ones followed during the Omer from the day following Passover until the culmination of the mourning for the death of the students of Rabbi Akiva (the thirty-third day of the Omer – such as refraining from marriage and haircuts. The Three Weeks culminate with Tisha Be-Av (9th of Av).

Ashkenazi communities refrain from wine and meat from the beginning of the month of Av, while Sefardi communities only do so from the second day of the month. The mourning continues until noon on the 10th of Av, the date on which the Second Temple's destruction was complete.

- 3 Tammuz** (circa 1272 BCE) – Joshua stops the sun (Joshua 10:1-15)
- 3 Tammuz** (1994 CE) – Death of Lubavitcher Rebbe Menachem Mendel Schneerson.
- 4 Tammuz** (1171 CE) – Death of Rabbeinu Tam
- 5 Tammuz** (circa 592 BCE) – Ezekiel receives his "Chariot" vision (Ezekiel 1:4-26)
- 6 Tammuz** (1976 CE) – Entebbe Rescue
- 9 Tammuz** (circa 586 BCE) – Jerusalem walls breached by King Nebuchadnezzar, a date observed as a fast day until the second breaching of Jerusalem's walls by the Romans on the 17th of Tammuz (70 CE)
- 17 Tammuz** (circa 1312 BCE) – Golden Calf offered by the Jewish people, 40 days after the giving of the Torah at Har Sinai. This is the first of the 5 national tragedies mourned on this day.
- 17 Tammuz** (circa 1312 BCE) – Smashing of the first Tablets by Moses.
- 17 Tammuz** (circa 586 BCE) – The daily sacrifices in the Holy Temple were discontinued.
- 17 Tammuz** (70 CE) – Walls of Jerusalem breached by the Roman army.
- 29 Tammuz** (1105 CE) – Death of Rashi

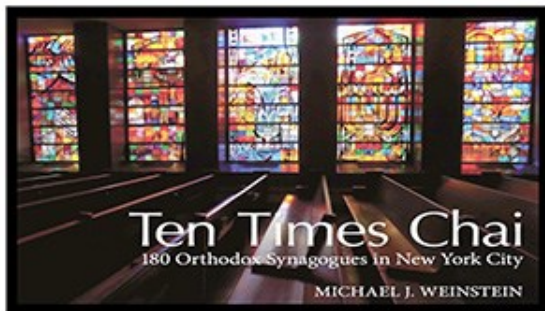

Inspired by his heritage and dedicated to the Holocaust survivors he met and befriended, **Michael Weinstein**, will give us a tour of 180 magnificent synagogues in the five boroughs of New York City. In order to learn as much as possible, Mr. Weinstein visited all 180 synagogues and took 613 photos – representing each of the 613 Mitzvot or commandments found in the Torah. He will give us a short history of these gems of our tradition – when they were founded, their names in Hebrew and the English translation of the names.

Mr. Weinstein is a 1985 graduate of Cornell University and he never imagined that he would create this magnificent book – “Ten Times Chai” – after he got involved in a program of visiting with Holocaust survivors in Brooklyn. Through these involvements with Holocaust survivors, which became a true act of “Chesed,” he got involved with their concerns regarding the various local synagogues. He then travelled all over and was very amazed at both the familiarity and diversity of these Orthodox synagogues. He went back and captured all the details and history of 180 synagogues in Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Staten Island - because there is so little that is left of the Jewish community in the “shtetls”. This is a very unique book - a reminder of the diversity as well as the unity of our traditions and heritage and a tribute to the freedom of religion in New York City and the United States of America.

Immerse yourself in these magnificent shuls – signed copies of the book will be available for purchase.

“Israelites reach the border of Canaan
12 spies to spy out the land..”

Forty days later they reported the Canaanites too powerful to conquer. Joshua and Caleb disagreed urging the people to enter. The people demanded to return to Egypt. G-d sentenced the entire slave generation would die in the desert - all except Joshua and Caleb. PARASHAT DEVARIM - 1:1 - 3:22

Before crossing the Jordan “he highlighted the Israelites military defeats as well as their triumphs - the fatal spying incident - their conquest of the Amorite kings Sihon and Og. You stayed long enough at this mountain. Go to the hill country of the Amorites, the hill country, the Negeb, the seacoast, the land of Canaanites and Lebanon, the great river Euphrates. 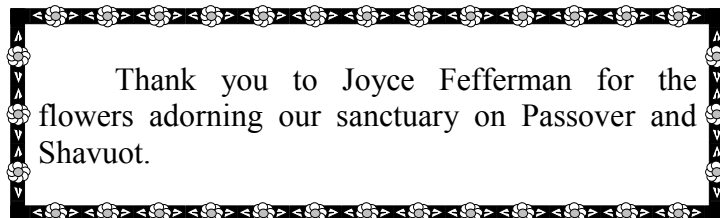
