

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Adar is the sixth month of the civil year and the twelfth month of the ecclesiastical year on the Hebrew calendar, roughly corresponding to the month of March in the Gregorian calendar. It is a winter month of 29 days. The Month of Adar in the Holy Scriptures comprises in Esther 09, 21.

In leap years, it is preceded by a 30-day intercalary month named **Adar Aleph** (Hebrew: 'אדר א', Aleph being the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet, also known as "Adar Rishon" (*First Adar*) or "Adar I") and it is then itself called **Adar Bet** (Hebrew: 'אדר ב', Bet being the second letter of the Hebrew Alphabet, also known as "Adar Sheni" (*Second Adar*) or "Adar II"). Occasionally instead of Adar I and Adar II, "Adar" and "Ve'Adar" are used (Ve means 'and' thus: And Adar). Adar I and II occur during February – March on the Gregorian calendar.

Based on a line in the Mishnah declaring that Purim must be celebrated in Adar II in a leap year (Megillah 1:4), Adar I is considered the "extra" month. As a result, someone born in Adar during a non leap year would celebrate his birthday in Adar II during a leap year. However, someone born during either Adar in a leap year will celebrate his birthday during Adar in a non-leap year, except that someone born on 30 Adar I will celebrate his birthday on 1 Nisan in a non-leap year because Adar in a non-leap year has only 29 days.

During the Second Temple period, there was a Jewish custom to make a public proclamation on the first day of the lunar month Adar, reminding the people that they are to prepare their annual monetary offering to the Temple treasury, known as the half-Shekel.

13 Adar (II in leap years) – Fast of Esther – on 11 Adar when the 13th falls on Shabbat – (Fast Day)

14 Adar (II in leap years) – Purim

14 Adar I (does not exist in non-leap years – Purim Katan

15 Adar (II in leap years) – Shushan Purim – celebration of Purim in walled cities existing during the time of Joshua

17 Adar (II in leap years) – Yom Adar celebration feast

IN JEWISH HISTORY

- **1 Adar** (circa 1313 BCE) Plague of Darkness, the ninth plague upon the Egyptians (Exodus 10:23). This started on the 1st of Adar, six weeks before the Exodus.
- 2 Adar (598 BCE) Jerusalem falls to Nebuchadnezzar and Jeconiah is captured.
- 3 Adar (515 BCE) Second Temple completed
- 7 Adar (1393 BCE) Birth of Moses
- 7 Adar (1273 BCE) Death of Moses
- 9 Adar (1st century BCE) Academic dissension between Beit Hillel and Beit Shammai, erupted into a violent and destructive conflict over a vote on 18 legal matters leading to the death of 3,000 students. The day was later declared a fast day by the Shulchan Aruch, however, it was never observed as such.
- 13 Adar (474BCE) War between Jews and their enemies in Persia (Book of Esther, chapter 9).
- **13 Adar** (161 BCE) *Yom Nicanor* The Maccabees defeated Syrian general Nicanor, in a battle fought four years after the Maccabees' liberation of the Holy Land and the miracle of Hanukkah.
- 14 Adar (474 BCE) Purim victory celebrated in the Persian Empire
- 15 Adar (474 BCE) Purim Victory Celebrated in Shushan

- 15 Adar (1st century CE) Jerusalem Gate Day King Agrippa I (circa 21 CE) began construction of a gate for the wall of Jerusalem; the day used to be celebrated as a holiday.
- 17 Adar (522 BCE) Yom Adar the day the Jewish people left Persia following the Purim story
- 20 Adar (1st century BCE) Choni the Circle Maker prays for rain (Talmud, Taanit 23a)
- 23 Adar (1312 BCE) Mishkan assembled for the first time; "Seven Days of Training" begin.
- 25 Adar (561 BCE) Death of Nebuchadnezzar (Jeremiah 52:31).
- 25 Adar (1761) Death of Rabbi Abraham Gershon of Kitov the brother-in-law and leading foe-turned-disciple of the Baal Shem Tov.
- 27 Adar (561 BCE) Death of Zedekiah in Babylonian captivity. Meroduch, Nebuchadnezzar's son and successor, freed him (and his nephew Jeconiah) on the 27th of Adar, but Zedekiah died that same day.

Adar Rishon (or Adar Aleph) occurs 7 times every 19 years.

Rosh Chodesh Adar II / ראש חודש אדר בי

Beginning of new Hebrew month of Adar II (on leap years). Adar II (sometimes "Adar Bet" or "Adar Sheni") is the 13th month of the Hebrew year, occurring only on leap years. Corresponds to February or March on the Gregorian calendar.

Rosh Chodesh Adar II begins at sundown on Wed, 06 March 2019.

Pesach celebrates the formation of the Jewish nation. A group of slaves who were far removed from G-d had to be taught that G-d is the Master of the Universe. Maimonides begins his monumental code of Jewish law declaring that, "the foundation of foundations and pillar of wisdom is to know that there is a G-d", Who is the source and cause of all of existence. Pesach is the holiday on which we celebrate G-d's role in history.

A thousand years later, we are able to recognize G-d even when He is hidden. Purim, in effect, represents the maturation of the Jewish people. No miracles are needed, as we understand that all that transpires is the will of G-d. Our calendar symbolically reflects this growth process. At the beginning of the year, in Nisan, we are in essence little children, who have difficulty understanding abstract concepts and need to see the direct power of G-d to be impressed. By the end of the year, in Adar, we have grown into adults, with a more sophisticated approach to our Master. Purim and Pesach cannot be separated; the link between open and hidden miracles must be emphasized.

Our Sages tell us that the story of Esther marks the end of the period of miracles. Once one understands that all of existence is a miracle, that Esther was the agent of G-d in redeeming the Jewish people, no more miracles are necessary.

We can now begin to understand why our Sages place such emphasis on Purim, equating it in importance to that of Yom Kippur. They saw it as a day of rededication to Torah, (recall the Torah we have today was given on Yom Kippur) and suggested that, while the books of the Neviim and Ketuvim will someday be abrogated, the book of Esther will never be annulled from the canon.

While we are full of joy as we recount the miracles of Pesach, a higher form of joy is to be found in the miracles of Purim. *MiShenichnas Adar Marbim BeSimcha*, when Adar enters we increase our joy. May we merit the ultimate joy of the final redemption. *Shabbat Shalom!*
