FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

THE THIRD MONTH, SIVAN

Sivan is the third of the twelve months of the Jewish calendar. It is the month in which G-d descended on Mt. Sinai and gave the Torah to the Jewish people. As noted elsewhere, there are only three months that are referred to ordinally in the Torah in conjunction with the exodus from Egypt: Nisan, Iyar, and Sivan. The name itself is of Babylonian origin. In the Bible, it is simply referred to as 'the third month'.

In the third month of the exodus from Egypt, they came to the Sinai desert.

A recurring theme is that the giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai is intrinsically linked with the number 3. For instance, the sages state,

Blessed is the Merciful one who gave a threefold Torah to a threefold people, by the third, on the third day, in the third month.

In this quote, G-d is referred to as the "Merciful one." G-d's attribute of mercy is itself related to the number 3, for it is the third of the seven emotive attributes of the soul (corresponding in Kabbalah to Jacob, the third of the three patriarchs, "the pillar of the Torah").

Letter: Zayin (ז)

Though Sivan is itself the third month of the year, the letter associated with it in Sefer Yitzirah (the letter by which G-d created the month of Sivan in time) is the letter *zayin* (ז), whose numerical value is 7. Both numbers, 3 and 7, are referred to by the sages as "beloved."

The connection between 3 and 7 is especially seen in regard to the giving of the Torah. The Torah, given in Sivan (the third month), was given on Shabbat, the seventh day of the week. According to Rabbi Yossi, that Shabbat was also the seventh day of Sivan.

In terms of its shape, the letter *zayin* is made up of a letter *vav* with a crown attached to its head. This represents the crown that every Jewish soul received at the giving of the Torah. The value of the word "crown" (כִּתּוֹר) is 620, and the text of the Ten Commandments given at Sinai contains exactly 620 letters.

The sages associate the letter *zayin* with the word "this" (זֶה). This word alludes to the unique nature of Moses' prophecy.

All the prophets begin their prophecies with the word "So [says the Almighty...]" above and beyond them is Moses who begins with the word "This [is what the Almighty says]."

The difference between the prophecies of Moses and all other prophets is compared to the difference between looking through a transparent pane of glass and looking through an opaque pane of glass. Moses was born and passed away on the 7th day of the month of Adar, the 12th month of the year, where 12 is the *gematria* of "this" (זֶה).

The number 7 is also connected with the Torah readings of the month of Sivan. Every year during Sivan we read *parshat Beha'alotcha*, the third portion of the Book of Numbers. In this *parshah*, there are two verses that are separated from the rest of the text by two upside down letters *nun* (ן).

When the Ark traveled, Moses would say, "Rise G-d, and Your enemies shall scatter before You, and those who hate You shall flee from You." And when it [the Ark] came to rest, he would say, "Return G-d to the multitude of thousands of Israel."

The sages explain that in effect these two verses are an entirely separate book of the Torah. According to this reckoning, the text of the Book of Numbers actually contains three separate books of the Torah: the text before these two verses, the two verses, and the text following the two verses. Thus, the total number of books of the Torah (i.e., the Pentateuch, because it is usually divided into only 5 books, Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy) is 7! This division of the Torah is alluded to in the verse, “She carved her pillars, seven.” Note also that the division of the Torah into 5 books alludes to the letter *hei* (ה) and the division into 7 books alludes to the letter *zayin* (ז). And, together, these two letters spell the word “this” (הַזֶּה) as above.

Mazal: Gemini (Twins)

The Zodiac sign of the twins first and foremost alludes to the two identical Tablets of the Covenant given to Moses at Mt. Sinai.

Tribe: Zebulun

The tribe of Zebulun shared a special bond with the tribe of Isaachar. They were born one after another to their mother, Leah. In the Land of Israel, they inherited lands that were adjacent, and temporally, they correspond to the two months Iyar and Sivan that follow one another. But, the heart of their bond was in their agreement to support one another. Isaachar was a tribe of scholars who excelled in Torah study. Zebulun was a tribe of successful merchants and seafarers. They agreed to split their material and spiritual wealth equally.

During Sivan, the drama which began with the exodus culminates with the giving of the Torah. Israel gains the ability to walk and becomes like G-d’s twin.

Holidays in Sivan

- **6-7 Sivan** - Shavuot - This year May 20-21, 2018

Sivan in Jewish history

- **6 Sivan** (circa 1313 BC) - The Torah was given to Moses at Mt. Sinai and thus observed as the holiday of Shavuot.
- **6 Sivan** (circa 1040 BC) - Birth of David.
- **6 Sivan** (1760) - Death of Baal Shem Tov
- **20 Sivan** (1171) - The first blood libel in France - tens of Jewish men and women were burned alive in the French town of Blois on the accusation that Jews used the blood of Christian children in the preparation of matzah for Passover.
- **23 Sivan** (474 BCE) - Mordechai and Esther sent letters so that the Jews shall prepare themselves for the annihilation plan orchestrated by Haman to be committed against them on the 13th of the following Adar.

FOCUS ON SISTERHOOD



And the Lord said, "And you shall count, from the day after Pesach, seven weeks until you number fifty days." (Shavu'ot)

Leviticus 23:6 - 17

This is the time of the counting of the Omer. Our Torah states, "And you shall count for yourself..." Each of us understands that it is a Mitzvah to count each individual day of the Omer, and the counting must not be done by rote or by a feeling of obligation. Rather counting is to be taken as a sign of our understanding that each day must be appreciated - that we must make each day be counted - and to undertake to improve ourselves each day so that we are prepared for, and worthy of, the Brit that our ancestors bequeathed to us.

The month of Iyar is full of remembrances and celebrations. May 3rd is the 33rd day of the Omer - Lag B'Omer - a joyful day in this mournful period. Sunday, the 13th of May is a double simcha. It is both Mother's Day as well as Yom Yerushalayim - the reunification of Jerusalem during the 6 Day War in 1967. And then suddenly in the middle of May it is Rosh Chodesh Sivan! And the first day of Shavu'ot on Sunday, May 20th. Watch the mail and don't miss this festive Chag. Together, and under the guidance and leadership of Rabbi & Rebbetzin Daniel, we shall enjoy our dairy luncheon, of course with cheesecake, and then together we shall study portions of the Book of Ruth. Reservations must be prepaid, so don't be left out.

We are most fortunate that our meeting on Monday, May 14th falls between two wonderful holidays full of important symbols that will allow us to study and discuss their meanings and purposes even in today's life and times. The first one is the story of Miriam and her well of water - and you are all aware of her symbol - the Kos Miriam - as well as her tambourine. The need for clean portable and plentiful water is historical and universal. Individuals without water die, and populations without this life requirement will die. Dehydration can be fatal. We shall further expand on this critical topic. The second holiday that affords us a present day comparison is the

Book of Ruth which we read on Shavu'ot. The story of Ruth, as well as that of Naomi, is full of stress and can easily be compared and be useful in discussing contemporary situations. When we first meet Ruth, she is overwhelmed - her life is in shambles. Today we are that woman - let us put ourselves in Ruth's place and explore how her story resonates as we confront challenges in our daily lives. How do we react physically, socially, spiritually and psychologically when we are overwhelmed? Please join our discussions.

And we are pleased that through the help of Linda Spiegel, Director of Public Affairs at Margaret Tietz Rehabilitation Center, we shall have a nurse or dietitian talk to us about health issues and improving the quality of our lives. Of course there will be questions and answers. Please bring a dairy sandwich or yogurt and we shall supply coffee and cake.

We wish a speedy and complete recovery to Agnes Posner.

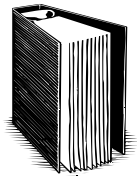

BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP



At our May 23rd meeting, we will be discussing Mohsin Hamid's Exit West which is a novel about migration and the ability to adapt. Those who leave their birth country leave behind the only life they know and, generally, people whom they love. Adaptability is a particularly desirable trait because there are so many new things to learn which include a different language, handling a new kind of money, finding employment, and learning new customs, conventions and practices.

In Exit West, Mr. Mohsin tells us about a man and a woman, Saeed and Nadia, who meet at an evening class in an unnamed city, in a country on the brink of a civil war. They fall in love. The dangers there are overwhelming and after much consideration they decide to leave their homeland. It is an insightful book for our times with a light touch of magical realism. Among the deep questions and ideas the author touches on are the many challenges faced by migrants which include, among others, the situations and attitudes of the host country. Also, how should immigrants and refugees be treated? The book raises many questions about the plights of immigrants, the receiving country, as well as the costs to personal relationships.

Exit West is an unforgettable story of love, loyalty and courage. It was named by *The New York Times* as one of the 10 Best Books of 2017.
