FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

ELUL

Elul, the month when many of us probably have returned or are returning from a vacation. You have returned at a time when all of us start the process of returning to G-d in the month of Elul.

Elul came up or returned with those Jews who returned to Israel from their 70 year exile in Babylonia. This is the month when we return to G-d, also called Repentance.

Elul is an acronym with its Hebrew letters "Aleph", "Lamed", "Vav", "Lamed" representing the words "Ani L'Dodi V'Dodi Li" (Song of Songs 6:3). The words mean "I am my Beloved's and my Beloved is mine," where my Beloved is G-d, and "I" am the Jewish people.

Moses' ascension to Mount Sinai for the eighth time, also for 40 days and 40 nights, started on Rosh Chodesh Elul and ended on Yom Kippur when he came back with the second set of Tablets as well as the decision by G-d to forgive the Jews of the sin of the golden calf.

Beginning the 2nd day of Elul, the custom is to blow the Shofar every weekday excluding Shabbat and Erev Rosh Hashanah. Elul is a time to reflect on Sin, failure in our relationship with G-d and turn to Repentance, Teshuvah, return to G-d.

The Torah tells us that no matter how far we stray from G-d, we should not despair. G-d will wait for us to return to Him through Teshuvah.

Maimonides heard in the sound of the Shofar the following inspirational message,

"Arise from your slumber, you who are asleep; wake up from your deep sleep, you who are fast asleep; search your deeds, repent, and remember your Creator. Let everyone give up his evil ways and his bad purpose....." That is why we say Selichot, prayers of Repentance.

The Sephardic and Mizrachi Jews say Selichot early morning every day before dawn starting from the 2nd of Elul right up to the eve of Yom Kippur, excluding Saturdays and Rosh Hashanah. In the Ashkenazi tradition it is normally on the Motzaei Shabbat (Saturday Night) immediately preceding Rosh Hashanah.

There are three levels of forgiveness: Selichah, Mechilah, and Kapparah.

Selichah, forgiveness is the first step. To say to G-d and to man "I am sorry for what I did. I regret it and will not do it again."


Mechila translated as "wiping away" is the response to the request: "Can we put our relationship back on the level which it was before I sinned against you."

Kapparah translated as "atonement": This is the response to the person who says, "My conscience will not let me live with myself, because of what I did to you and to our relationship."

When you really get down to it, Teshuva is a kind of death and rebirth, a demise of the past and a birth of a new life and a new creature. The rewards are tremendous: a sense of having returned home and of being a part of a majestic tradition, a sense of the grandeur and beauty and warmth of it all, the awareness of G-d's presence in our daily life, the feeling of meaning and purpose that permeates one's self. Life becomes coherent and whole again.

PARASHAT KI TETZE 21.10 - 25.19

Moses recounts many laws laying the groundwork for a just society concerning: women captured in war, birthrights, a disobedient son, lost property, robbing a bird's nest, adultery and rape, prostitution, divorce, loans, levirate marriage, honest weights and measures. The Israelites must remember Amalek's treachery against them in the desert on your journey after you left Egypt. You shall not plow with an ox and an ox together, and not wear cloth made of wool and linen together. You shall not turn over to his master's slave who seeks refuge with you from his master. No woman shall be a cult prostitute, nor any man. NASANEL CARMEN

Meet a special Bimah personality - Nasanel Carmen. Nasanel Carmen was born in Detroit, Michigan. His father's grandparents came from Kiev, Ukraine. His mother's parents came from Romania and Poland. The arts and Chazzanut came from his mother's side of the family. He came from generations of Cantors, and his first teacher was his grandfather, Cantor Abraham Schachter.

His education included elementary, high school and Rabbinical College at Yeshivath Beth Yehudah in the Greater Detroit area. He later studied in Ner Israel Rabbinical College in Baltimore, Maryland, Yeshivas Brisk in Jerusalem and Beth Medrash Govoha in Lakewood, New Jersey, where he studied singing with the great Cantor Abraham Weingarten and Chazzanut with Cantor Moshe Korogodsky. He was also very close with the Jewish pop singer and songwriter, Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach, who encouraged him to compose his own music.

During the time that Cantor Carmen studied in Lakewood, New Jersey, he was the Chazzan at Congregation Agudath Achim in Bradley Beach, New Jersey. In 1996 he was invited by the United States Army base in Fort Hood, Texas to officiate the High Holidays. Since then he officiated and performed in synagogues and stages around the world.
